Student with a Disability

• A student who has a mental, physical, or emotional disability that affects how they learn in school. Students with disabilities may qualify to receive special education services.

English Language Learner (ELL)

 A student who is learning to speak/write/read/understand English. ELLs are entitled to receive instruction and support in school to help them learn English.

ELLs with Disabilities

• Students who have a disability and who are learning English. They have a right to receive special education services in their language (if needed).







Individuals with Disabilities Education Act



I.D.E.A.: The Federal Law that protects children with disabilities.

It says that all children (through age 21) with a disability have a right to a:

FREE

APPROPRIATE

PUBLIC

EDUCATION

What is Special Education?



Special Education is:

 A set of supports and services designed to meet the needs of a child with a disability.

• These supports and services are included in the child's Individualized Education Program (IEP).



• Services can be given in the child's home language. This is called Bilingual Special Education.







The Special Education Process











Referral and Consent – In your Language



How to refer?

- Send a letter <u>via email, in your language</u>, to the principal or <u>specialeducation@schools.nyc.gov</u>
- Can also bring a letter to child's school on paper, in person
- Write it in your language

School then asks parent to give consent (signature). Ask for documents in your language!

All testing and IEP meeting must happen within 60 school days of the time parent gives written consent



Special Education Evaluations - Bilingual



Evaluations of child done in English and child's home language

You have the right to request a bilingual special education evaluation if your child's home language is not English

All children who are ELLs must be first evaluated in both English and home language.







Individualized Education Program - IEP



What is an IEP?

- The IEP is a document created at an IEP Meeting after the student is evaluated
- Unique to each student
- Includes information about the student and the plan to help them learn
- Legal (like a contract)
- Good for one year

Who is Present at an IEP Meeting?

- Parents(s)
- Special Education Teacher
- General Education Teacher
- School Psychologist
- District Representative
- Student (15 years and older)
- Other Persons (Interpreters)

All IEP meetings are still being conducted on video/phone call!







Translations of Special Education Documents



The DOE must translate all special education documents in the top nine languages when parents request it.

- Special education documents include IEPs, evaluations, notices, and 504 Plans
- Ask for a translation at your child's school, online at <u>www.schools.nyc.gov/IEPhello</u>, or by phone: (718) 935-2013

Bilingual Special Education Classrooms



Children learn academic skills and receive special education support in their home language

Taught in English and your child's home language

Can be ICT, or smaller, special class

In community and District 75 schools

Either Dual Language (DL) or Transitional Bilingual Education (TBE)

To find a bilingual special education class, email BSEprograms@schools.nyc.gov









What if my child's school does not have a bilingual special education classroom?



Your child can transfer to a school that offers bilingual special education services or a bilingual classroom.

Tell the school that you would like to transfer your child or email BSEprograms@schools.nyc.gov

If a transfer is not possible, your child might stay in an English-only class and be assigned an alternate placement paraprofessional who will interpret for your child in class.

Your child should continue to receive ENL.

Related Service Authorizations



There are a limited number of bilingual clinicians, such as speech therapists and psychologists in NYC public schools.

Not all schools can provide related services in your child's home language.

The DOE can give you a Related Service Authorization (RSA) to be able to get bilingual related services outside of school.

RSAs allow parents to choose an independent provider to provide these services, and the DOE will pay for them.

Parents Have the Right to...



Say yes or no to special education

Ask for new evaluations, including independent bilingual evaluations

Fully participate in all IEP meetings

Have the DOE provide an interpreter who speaks your language and have the DOE translate documents

Get notice in writing before the school changes a child's IEP or services
